Reading: 1 Kings 2: 10 – 12, 3: 3 – 14

¹⁰ Then David rested with his ancestors and was buried in the City of David. ¹¹ He had reigned forty years over Israel—seven years in Hebron and thirty-three in Jerusalem. ¹² So Solomon sat on the throne of his father David, and his rule was firmly established.

³ Solomon showed his love for the Lord by walking according to the instructions given him by his father David, except that he offered sacrifices and burned incense on the high places.

⁴ The king went to Gibeon to offer sacrifices, for that was the most important high place, and Solomon offered a thousand burnt offerings on that altar. ⁵ At Gibeon the Lord appeared to Solomon during the night in a dream, and God said, “Ask for whatever you want me to give you.”

⁶ Solomon answered, “You have shown great kindness to your servant, my father David, because he was faithful to you and righteous and upright in heart. You have continued this great kindness to him and have given him a son to sit on his throne this very day.

⁷ “Now, Lord my God, you have made your servant king in place of my father David. But I am only a little child and do not know how to carry out my duties. ⁸ Your servant is here among the people you have chosen, a great people, too numerous to count or number. ⁹ So give your servant a discerning heart to govern your people and to distinguish between right and wrong. For who is able to govern this great people of yours?”

¹⁰ The Lord was pleased that Solomon had asked for this. ¹¹ So God said to him, “Since you have asked for this and not for long life or wealth for yourself, nor have asked for the death of your enemies but for discernment in administering justice, ¹² I will do what you have asked. I will give you a wise and discerning heart, so that there will never have been anyone like you, nor will there ever be. ¹³ Moreover, I will give you what you have not asked for—both wealth and honour—so that in your lifetime you will have no equal among kings. ¹⁴ And if you walk in obedience to me and keep my decrees and commands as David your father did, I will give you a long life.”

Reading: Ephesians 5: 15 - 20

¹⁵ Be very careful, then, how you live—not as unwise but as wise, ¹⁶ making the most of every opportunity, because the days are evil. ¹⁷ Therefore do not be foolish, but understand what the Lord’s will is. ¹⁸ Do not get drunk on wine, which leads to debauchery. Instead, be filled with the Spirit, ¹⁹ speaking to one another with psalms, hymns, and songs from the Spirit. Sing and make music from your heart to the Lord, ²⁰ always giving thanks to God the Father for everything, in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Reading: John 6: 51 - 58

⁵¹ I am the living bread that came down from heaven. Whoever eats this bread will live forever. This bread is My flesh, which I will give for the life of the world.”

⁵² Then the Jews began to argue sharply among themselves, “How can this man give us his flesh to eat?”

⁵³ Jesus said to them, “Very truly I tell you, unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink His blood, you have no life in you. ⁵⁴ Whoever eats My flesh and drinks My blood has eternal life, and I will raise them up at the last day. ⁵⁵ For My flesh is real food and My blood is real drink. ⁵⁶ Whoever eats My flesh and drinks My blood remains in Me, and I in them. ⁵⁷ Just as the living Father sent Me and I live because of the Father, so the one who feeds on Me will live because of Me. ⁵⁸ This is the bread that came down from heaven. Sermon

“Be very careful, then, how you live—not as unwise but as wise.”
Ephesians 5: 15

We would all like to think that every decision, every action we made was made with wisdom. I know that there have been decisions made by me that have turned out to be anything other than wise. Perhaps you are able to empathise with that.

Where does wisdom come from? Are we born with wisdom as a gift of God to us? Is wisdom something we learn with experience? Is wisdom gained through education?

The vast majority of people in the western world receive a good education. If wisdom comes through the learning of the three R’s and associated subjects then surely we would all be wise. Yet wisdom is not gained by learning.

There are many learned people in my sphere of acquaintances who are highly intelligent yet lack what we could call to be common sense. Some of them even reject Christ as Saviour and view the Holy Bible as a collection of stories and myths.

In his first letter to the Church at Corinth, the Apostle Paul writes quoting the words of Isaiah:

“I will destroy the wisdom of the wise; the intelligence of the intelligent I will frustrate.” (Isaiah 29: 14, 1 Corinthians 1: 19)

This Paul includes after he has written, “for the message of the Cross is foolishness to those who are perishing but for those who are being saved it is the power of God”.

We may gather from these words that not all the intelligent are wise and that not all the unintelligent are fools. By this we mean that if we truly believe and commune with God the Father through His Son, Jesus Christ, with God’s Holy Spirit dwelling in our very being we will not be frustrated by the message of Christ Jesus – that He came into this world so that we may have life in all its fullness and the hope of life eternal when we pass through the veil.

Solomon was the son of David. David had been king for forty years. David had not always acted wisely - we can think of some of the unwise actions he did. Yet David was always mindful of what God had given him.

When Solomon succeeded David it was not surprising that he, too, was devout and relied upon God to lead him. Solomon worshipped God in many places and in many ways. We do not have burnt offerings and ritual slaughter today – well, not in my church! – but it was the done thing for the Jews all those years before the coming of Jesus.

Yet, with all his power and authority as king, Solomon knew where his limitations lay. When, in a dream, God asked Solomon what he wanted Solomon did not reply with what we may think to be the obvious answer.

Solomon had riches – he needed no more. He had a good life – maybe he could live and rule for many more years than did his father, David. But that was not what Solomon knew he needed to be a good king, a good ruler.

He knew that if he was to be a good king, a leader of the people, he would need to have wisdom. He would need the ability to make wise judgements.

Solomon asked not for riches and health and long life, he asked for wisdom and discernment. Such a request pleased God and God gave Solomon the ability to act wisely and to be a fair judge.

The author of the Letter to the church at Ephesus will have known that there had been unwise actions and words at that church. Hence the call to ‘act wisely’.

From the letter we may glean that not all at that church were living Christian lives. They were allowing the lives of non-Christian neighbours to taint their lives. That church had made decisions that were pleasing only to the evil of the days that was prevalent outside the church in society. Decisions that the writer describes as unwise.

There is a church that wished to evangelise the community in which the church was set and many of the congregation lived. They discussed evangelism at the church council, in meetings of smaller groups and even in their homes over a coffee.

They came up with a solution on how to evangelise the community. They would remove the stout oak doors at the front of the church building and replace them with glass doors so that people passing by could see into the church.

In all their deliberations they had forgotten two things. Firstly, they had not sought the will of God. In all their discussions and deliberations their thoughts had been more about how they could say they were evangelising without actually getting involved in person.

Like many churches the congregation was elderly and had been attending church since they had been very young children. They had become stale in worship, study and prayer. Worship on a Sunday was more akin to a club than a church. They had simply forgotten to listen to what God was saying to them although they had plenty to say to God!

Secondly, they had ignored the fact that the church is on a quiet residential road and hardly anyone passed by on a Sunday morning. We could not claim it as an act of God but fortunately the whole idea of glass doors has been dropped. We would like to think that wisdom allied to common sense prevailed.

Wisdom is not the prerogative of the leaders in the Church of Christ. We may consider our ministers to have wisdom, our lay leaders to have wisdom and the hierarchy of the Church to also be wise. They may be good administrators and excellent orators but that does not necessarily give them the mark of wisdom.

John records the words of Jesus in his rendition of the Good News. In chapter 6, verse 47 Jesus tells the people, “Very truly I tell you, the one who believes has eternal life”.

When we believe we have faith. When we have faith and claim Jesus as Lord and Saviour we gain wisdom. Not the wisdom of this world which blows in the wind and is here today and gone tomorrow.

When we come to faith we gain wisdom from God. The wisdom to love our brothers and sisters regardless of ethnicity, wealth or poverty. For those who are in Christ are rich with the Love of Christ shining in our lives, in our words, in our work and in our actions.

Faith brings wisdom to all who truly believe. Wisdom that can only come from God.

Solomon asked for nothing more than wisdom, to act and live wisely. May we who have Christ Jesus at the centre of our lives also ask for that same wisdom; not to rule but to act justly and live wisely. AMEN
